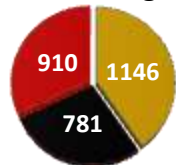


Fireground Ladder Operations

Portable ladders are the most functional versatile, durable, and rapid deployable tools on the fireground. The training focused on the deployment of the full complement of ladders supplied on Tower 53 and Ladder 51. Along with the deployment of the ladders each member was required to climb the ladder and prepare to receive a victim from one of the accessible windows. The ladders consisted of 16, 18, 24, 28, 35 and 40 portable ground ladders



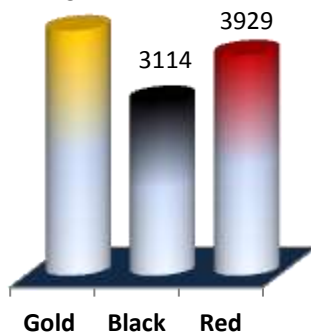
Shift Training Hours

Hydrant Operations

One of the topics for the month was to provide comprehensive training on hydrant operations and hook ups. Fire hydrants provide water for firefighting purposes. They are part of the public municipal water distribution system. The training conducted this month was to emphasize the use and operations of the hydrant as it supplies the engine at the emergency scene. Other topics covered: spacing, driver / operator vehicle positions, and supply considerations.
